The oak leaves that we have so many of don't seal off the top like they did with the old set-up, so things seem to be composting a lot quicker. Plus it's really easy to dig without sides to reach over.



	Leg bands are an important waterfowl research and management tool that over the years has provided biologists with a good understanding of bird movements, especially migration. The boundaries of the Pacific, Central, Mississippi, and Atlantic flyways were developed from bar recovery data. Waterfowl banding along with aerial surver and the Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program are critical to the successful management of migratory waterfowl populations.
• • • • •	Modern banding of migratory birds is a collaborative effor of Canadian and U.S. wildlife agencies. In the United States, banding is the responsibility of the Bird Banding Lab (BBL) of the U.S. Geological Survey - Biological Resources Division. Both countries use the same bands, reporting forms and data formats to ensure consistency of the data collected. In the U.S. waterfowl banding studies are generally conducted cooperatively among state and federal agencies. Every year more than 200,000 ducks ar 100,000 geese are banded in North America. Most of the banding occurs in waterfowl breeding areas.
	Mottled Ducks spend their entire lives along the coasts of Texas and Louisiana and have been determined to be a "Species of Concern." The numbers of this unique duck have been slowly declining but the factors behind this decline are not well understood. Unlike other migratory waterfowl, these birds breed, nest, raise broods, molt, ar winter in the same general area. Considering the focus of banding and other research activities on migratory waterfowl, relatively little is known about the movements and preferred nesting and molting requirements of this local duck. KPC and TPWD biologists have banded Mottled Ducks two of the last four years, and we are banding

again this year.

Our first banding effort this year was quite an adventure. I joined several TPWD biologists in July to capture, band, and take biological samples from a total of twenty-one birds including seven Mottled Ducks, nine Black-bellied Whistling Ducks, four Blue-winged Teal, and even one Purple Gallinule. We hope to band waterfowl on at least two other sites by fall.

Prairie Journal Reflections on the Prairie It seems hard to think of a time when Michael Morton was not creating incredible images of the Katy Prairie. But there must have been such a time, because when we browse our photo archives, one can easily tell which photographs are BMM (before Michael Morton) and which ones are AMM (after Michael

which ones are AMM (after Michael Morton). Michael is not only a talented and creative chronicler of the prairie, he is also an incredibly generous one. He has allowed the Katy Prairie Conservancy to use the images from the prairie in our presentations, brochures, and on our website. Please visit <u>www.morton photography.net</u> to experience first-hand the wonder of the Katy Prairie.

KPC: You have taken many memorable photos of the Katy Prairie. How did your relationship with the prairie start?

M.M.: Having grown weary - financially strapped - one season of traveling all over the state, I was looking for places near my home in Katy to shoot between trips around Texas. Being a native Houstonian, I was familiar with Katy and its huge surrounding of "nothingness." I mean I remember duck and goose hunting there when I was younger, but I didn't remember anything that stood out about the landscape- just huge open fields of rice and grass. However, it was close, so I had to check it out. I remember the ducks and geese but now, looking at the area through older eyes, I noticed other birds, a lot of other birds. While checking out the Texas Costal Birding Trail sites in the Katy area, I stumbled upon Nelson Farms and a little sign that read Katy Prairie Conservancy. I think it was Wesley Newman whom I contacted first: he introduced me to Mary Anne Piancentini, two of the nicest people I have ever met in my life. I asked Mary Anne if she would allow me to shoot on the KPC properties (I told her I was famous), in return the KPC could use any of my images for their own use. She said OK and my dear relationship with everyone at the KPC began. I am eternally grateful to them for allowing me to photograph this special piece of our planet.

KPC: How do you choose motifs for your prairie photos?

M.M.: I don't. Tried once- didn't work. I just "go with the flow" now and let nature decide what I will shoot today-whatever is in season. In the spring I photograph the

wildflowers and the ENORMOUS varieties of plants and grasses (I soon discovered the "nothingness" was quite the opposite- photographing the prairie is truly going back to school). During the bird migrations, I have the opportunity to shoot varieties of bird species that would fill an encyclopedia. If the birds or plant life doesn't provide the "magic" on any particular day, there are still plenty of insects to photograph, or frogs, or landscapes, or small mammals.

KPC: Tell us about an interesting moment, a story, or something you've learned while being on the prairie.

M.M.: Going back to the previous question, I have learned that the Katy Prairie is so much more than a giant ocean of grass. To really appreciate what a unique and valuable ecosystem this is, you have to spend some time out there and take a closer look, sometimes on your hands and knees with a magnifying glass, sometimes with camouflage and binoculars, sometimes at night! I could spend the rest of my career photographing nothing but the Katy Prairie and still capture only a fraction of the life that exists out there. It truly is a treasure that *must* be protected, and it's right in our own back yard.

KPC: What do you like most about the prairie and what would be your message to the people who have never been to the Katy Prairie?

M.M.: I hate to just throw out a rubber stamp answer, but what I like most about the Katy Prairie are the birds. To those who have never been to the Katy Prairie, you are missing one of nature's most awesome spectacles. Any day on the prairie is a treat for birders. However, get out there early in the morning during the Fall/Winter migration and witness birds of all types, in flocks numbering in the hundreds, sometimes thousands, taking a pit stop on this unique Tallgrass prairie. Year after year, decade after decade. At least for now. Please help us save what's left of the Katy Prairie, because it's worth it.

KPC: Is there something we forgot to ask you?

M.M.: Um, I'm a Libra, I love my family, and water sports.


'We were surrounded by them without seeing the edge of the school and we could see many under the water surface too. I feel very fortunate I was there in the right place at the right time to experience nature at its best'

Measuring up to 7ft (2.1 meters) from wing-tip to wing-tip, Golden rays are also more prosaically known as cow nose rays.



They have long, pointed pectoral fins that separate into two lobes in front of their high-domed neads and give them a cow-like appearance. Despite having poisonous stingers, they are known to be shy and non-threatening when in large schools.

The population in the Gulf of Mexico migrates, in schools of as many as 10,000, clockwise from western Florida to the Yucatan .


Amazing striped icebergs

Icebergs in the Antarctic area sometimes have stripes, formed by layers of snow that react to different conditions .


Blue stripes are often created when a crevice in the ice sheet fills up with meltwater and freezes so quickly that no bubbles form .


When an iceberg falls into the sea, a layer of salty seawater can freeze to the underside . If this is rich in algae, it can form a green stripe .

Brown, black and yellow lines are caused by sediment, picked up when the ice sheet grinds downhill towards the sea ..



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
